Guyana, Brazil open talks on Lethem road, deep water harbour

January 11,2013—Demerara Waves

President Donald Ramotar has opened talks with his Brazilian counterpart Dilma Rousseff on the execution of several projects here including paving the road to Lethem.

He made the announcement at a media briefing on Friday at the Office of the President. The Guyanese leader was in neighbouring Brazil for one day last month to attend the regional trade bloc MERCOSUR Summit.

"I had a meeting with the president of Brazil and we spoke about what I consider very important projects that I think are coming closer to fruition, like the (Lethem) road, the deep water harbour and more hydropower facilities.

Hopefully in the new month I'll probably be meeting some (officials) to establish a technical team from Brazil and Guyana to start to work and try to bring these things into operation as early as possible," the president said.

Ramotar noted that some of these projects would also benefit Brazil such as hydropower. It is also expected that with the paving of the Lethem to Linden road Brazilian industry in the north of South America's largest country would get ready access to a seaport with the construction of the deep water harbour in Berbice.

The majority opposition parties say they want to ensure more equitable and fairer governance, especially in the financial operations of the administration, and closer scrutiny of the budget and contracts. The minority PPP Government disagree with their interference, so Parliament is a hotbed and seems to be in gridlock.

The main issue in Guyana today is the Constitution: Who manages Guyana? Is it the elected Parliament? Is it the Executive - Ministers and Ministries? Is it the Judiciary? Or is it the Executive President who has veto power over Parliament's bills? Also, unlike the previous 1964 Constitution, this Burnham 1980 constitution bans coalitions after elections. It means that minority governments can govern against the wishes of the majority of voters. Is this Democracy?

We in the Diaspora look on and wish Guyana all the best as it tries to solve its governance issues.

Commentary: Save City Hall in Georgetown

Architectural heritage in peril

Anyone who has any feeling for the architectural heritage of Georgetown must be in despair every time they pass City Hall – if they can bear to look at it at all, that is. What is the matter with those who sit in authority over us that they cannot see that one of the capital's architectural and historical treasures is disintegrating before their eyes? What is the matter with them that they do not think that this is a scandal? Why have they abrogated their responsibility to the citizens who live here and now, as well as future generations, who will surely condemn them for their dereliction? Do they have absolutely no sense of the aesthetic or the historical that they can pass by this deteriorating landmark and not experience even a frisson of disquiet?

Well, now it seems, the benighted structure is falling victim to the muddle that is the Mayor and City Council, and the muddle that is the Ministry of Local Government, and the lacuna between

the two. It is bad news for repairs and bad news for preservation. As the story in our edition today shows, even the money which former president, Mr Bharrat Jagdeo gave last year for emergency repairs has not yet been spent in total. The M&CC was given \$20M, of which only \$5M has so far been expended. According to Mayor Hamilton Green the council was waiting for the City Engineer's Department to put forward a project proposal – for some months, one presumes. The city engineer had been told to start with the roof, but had begun with the windows instead and had done some work there. The Mayor said they were awaiting a report on the fact the \$5M was not spent properly.

Well if all of that is not enough to make the sanest resident of Georgetown scream in exasperation, there is more. Minister in the Ministry of Local Government and Regional Development Norman Whittaker has asked Mr Keith Burrowes, it seems, to manage the money (no complaints there), and review any payment to be made in

this particular project. Exactly what progress he has made with the engineer's department has not been revealed, but one can infer not too much, since not too much seems to be happening. Our reporter did ask Deputy Mayor Patricia Chase-Green what efforts the senior members of the council were making to get the City Engineer's Department to function efficiently, and she replied, "When we intervene in matters of the council the officers run to the Minister who advise[s] them and they do not worry with the council."

Death knell for City Hall

On the face of it this sounds like the death knell for City Hall: the department which is responsible for the emergency repairs is not doing what it should, and the council can do nothing because the officers complain to the Minister as a consequence of which they feel they can ignore the council. What is the matter with the Minister and the council? If both sides know that a department has urgent work to do that is not being done, can't they operate in concert to ensure that it is? Are we so far gone in terms of the political divide, that we would allow an important item of our material heritage to fall to pieces just because of pettiness?

Other than the most unreconstructed philistines, those who live and work in Georgetown would not hesitate to say they wanted City Hall to be saved. Furthermore, they would say they did not care two goat's whiskers who accomplished this. What they would not want to hear about is disputes or misunderstandings or lack of communication or lack of cooperation or lack of funds or lack of urgency. And if all the officials involved – government, city council and even the opposition – are not seized of the urgency of the matter, then the odds are we will not be bequeathing this particular heritage building which was handed down to us by earlier citizens, to those who will come after us.

Mayor Green did advert to the fact that they needed international help for total restoration.

No doubt this is true. But emergency repairs apart, the first stage in the larger renovation of the structure is an assessment of exactly what would have to be done, and how much it would cost. That might mean bringing down an overseas specialist, which the government - perhaps in the form of the National Trust - and not the city council would have to do. But if it does do so, there should be no shopping around the international agencies for funding to pay for the expert to come here. That expense, at least, the central administration should be able to withstand, and surely the opposition would not object to a supplementary for the purpose if necessary. Once there is a costing then the matter of the larger project can be attended to. Of course, the government will want foreign funding for that exercise, and perhaps it will get it – or get it in part.

Georgetown uniqueness being destroyed

But supposing, for the sake of argument, it doesn't, why can't we pay for this ourselves? It wouldn't cost anything like the kind of sums the government is proposing to sink into the unappealing Marriott Hotel, which from the drawings supplied has no aesthetic qualities to recommend it, and bears not even the remotest relationship to this country's architectural traditions. Georgetown's unique character is being systematically destroyed, and all these tourists which Minister Irfaan Ally burbles on so optimistically about, are simply not going to come to a city of concrete and glass (even if the garbage has been cleared), which is just a smaller scale version of where they live. If he had his priorities right, he would regard saving City Hall and the few remaining historical buildings in private and public hands, as being at the very top of his to do list.

Just for once, will the government, the council, the relevant agencies and politicians of all persuasions commit to saving City Hall in 2013.

But High Court Justice Diana Insanally has ruled that Chang had been granted a mining licence before the Act came into force and neither the Council nor the GGMC could stop Chang's operation. [more]

No impartiality where needed

Examining the relationship between the Ministry of Health and the new Guyana Pharmaceutical Corporation.

This past Monday (January 14, 2013), the Public Accounts Committee of the National Assembly began examining the relationship between the Ministry of Health and the new Guyana Pharmaceutical Corporation.

For more than a decade the government has been paying the New Guyana Pharmaceutical Corporation billions of dollars each year for the supply of drugs, to the exclusion of many other agencies with the potential to supply the drugs.

There are many questions, some representing the continuation of comments by the Auditor General. Indeed, there have been questions about the relationship between the government and the New Guyana Pharmaceutical Corporation. There have even been questions about the pricing to the extent that there have been accusations of price gouging.

However, since that issue is now before the Public Accounts Committee the revelations or explanations should be forthcoming and there would be extensive media reports. What is of more interest at this is the partisan nature of the Public Accounts Committee. This body exists in every parliament. It is expected to monitor government expenditure of money released by the very parliament.

Indeed, there is the report by the Auditor General which highlights discrepancies in the various accounting practices in Government Ministries and departments. These discrepancies are more often than not, noted and corrected or at least attempts are made to correct them. But sometimes they are ignored and repeated the following year. This has been the case with the relationship between the government and the New GPC. When that happens, the Public Accounts Committee would become involved. [more]

UG officially launches US\$10 M science and tech project

"We will subsidise it to the extent that we'll charge probably around \$100 (US.50 cents) an hour so it will be very affordable for students with the ability to have access to good download speeds and upload speeds wherever they are on campus."

"We're hoping that this service will come in with the opening of the new university term on the 28 January. We've been working on it for the last few months and we're actually hoping to roll out a high speed data Wi-Fi system over the entire UG campus (Turkeyen). [more]



New IRS laws could hurt Caribbean tourism industry

According to the Nassau Guardian, the BHTA has brought to the urgent attention of the Caribbean Hotel and Tourism Association the fact that US credit card companies have been mandated to implement an automatic 28% withholding fee unless the merchant receiving the payment is compliant with new Inland Revenue Service (IRS) regulations. LIAT signs deal for 3 48seater aircraft from ATR

Sinckler said in a statement that it was generally expected that since Standard & Poor's had made their adjustment to the country's credit rating some months ago, it was altogether likely that Moody's would align their rating accordingly.

Sweet boost for cane industry

The revitalisation of Barbados sugarcane industry could be in for a massive boost from the Japanese.

Minister of Agriculture, Food, Fisheries and Water Resource Management, Dr. David Estwick, is to meet with representatives of the globally influential Japanese company, Marubeni Corporation, who have expressed an interest in funding the entire Cane Industry Restructuring Project.

The meeting will take place on January 28, at the ministry's headquarters at Graeme Hall, Christ Church, at 10 a.m.

The Barbados Cane Industry Corporation, with the support of the Ministry of Agriculture, is in the process of implementing the project which aims to convert the existing Barbados sugar industry into a sugarcane and renewable energy industry. This new thrust will result in the processing of over 330,000 tonnes of sugar cane to produce 15,000 tonnes of raw sugar, 12,000 tonnes of refined sugar and 24,000 tonnes of molasses.

In addition to the bagasse by-product from the processing of sugarcane, a further 150,000 tonnes of river tamarind biomass will be used to generate over 170,000 megawatt hours of electricity. The facilities are expected to come on stream in January, 2016. Project manager with the BCIC, Carl Simpson, explained that the proposed funding for the project would be delivered in two phases. Jamaica sugar industry to focus on local market

Jamaica's sugar import will see a reduction for the 2012-2013 crop year following a decision to focus on supplying the lucrative local market.

"We have a preliminary projection of about 140,000 tonnes for the next sugar crop, and we will be supplying all the sugar needed for the domestic market from this amount," Ambassador Derrick Heaven, executive chairman of the Sugar Industry Authority (SIA), told The Gleaner.

Jamaica imports some 60,000 tonnes of brown sugar annually, mainly from other producing countries in the region to satisfy local demand. However, the additional 65,000 tonnes of the refined product that the country also consumes would still have to be sourced from overseas.

"I can safely say that as of this 2012-2013 crop year, all the raw sugar for local consumption will be supplied from locally produced sugar.

Contractor General's statements hurting Jamaica – AG

Attorney General Patrick Atkinson says that uncontrolled media releases from the Office of the Contractor General (OCG) will only serve to hurt Jamaica's reputation internationally .

Water woes across T&T

The plan will involve "re-allocation of supply from the Caroni Water Treatment Plant, managed diversion of supplies from other production facilities to supplement supply to certain areas of North, Central and South Trinidad, introduction of temporary supply schedules, system of storage at critical service reservoirs, increase in level of water trucking, leak management and system upgrades".

An historic victory for the Opposition party has enhanced the position of Dr Keith Rowley as leader and as a prime minister in waiting. The PNM improved on its previous position of eight seats against the Tobago Organisation of the People's (TOP) four. Prime Minister Kamla Persad-Bissessar and Ashworth Jack were strongly rebuffed by the electorate. Jack lost his seat and his political career is in jeopardy.

T&T's economic outlook 'stable' -US-based ratings agency - Moody's

January 19, 2013

United States-based ratings agency Moody's has reaffirmed the Baa1 government bond rating of Trinidad and Tobago, with an economic outlook regarded as "stable" for the country.

The New York offices of the company released the report on Trinidad and Tobago Wednesday on its website.

Key drivers of the rating action, Moody's said, were:

- Continued resilience of the government's balance sheet despite some deterioration of government debt.
- Significant fiscal savings in a sovereign wealth fund and a strong external position supported by persistent current account surpluses and a large foreign exchange reserve buffer.
- A challenging growth outlook contingent on the resumption of activity in the energy sector following a protracted recession.

T&T intensifies drive to deport illegals, Guyanese topped 2012 list

January 19, 2012(Trinidad Guardian)

Over the last two years T&T has intensified its deportation of illegal immigrants and criminals as some 750 people were sent back to their respective countries in Africa, Asia and Europe. Statistics from the Immigration Department also revealed the US deported 630 criminals to T&T between 2011 and 2012 after serving sentences for offences including drug trafficking, robbery, gun possession and rape....

In 2011, 272 illegal immigrants were deported to their various countries with Guyana topping the list with 121. "Among those deported in 2011 were 19 nationals from China, 27 nationals from the Dominican Republic, 16 Jamaicans, 14 Colombians, 11 from Ghana, 11 Indian nationals, seven Venezuelans, six Indonesians, five from St Vincent, four from Bangladesh and four Nigerians," Warner said.

T&T signs deal for largest ever IDB loan to English-speaking Caribbean

January 21, 2013 - Trinidad Express

Government on Saturday signed an agreement with the Inter-American Development Bank (IDB) for the largest loan ever granted to any country in the English-speaking Caribbean.

Minister of Planning and the Economy Dr Bhoendradatt Tewarie and president of the IDB Luis Alberto Moreno signed off on a US\$246.5 million facility, the first tranche of a US\$546.5 million loan, for a three-phase wastewater rehabilitation programme in the country.

The first phase that we are bringing today is very significant as it will increase access to wastewater collection and treatment services to a large segment of the population and therefore it will help decrease the uncontrolled discharge of the untreated wastewater into the environment.

Suriname Feature: "Paving the way to a prosperous future"



The Jules Wijdenbosch Bridge also called Suriname bridge, is a bridge Suriname over the river between the capital city of Paramaribo and Meerzorg. It was opemed in 2000.

"The idea of linking Suriname to its neighbors is part of the Initiative for the Integration of the Regional Infrastructure of South America." - Ramon Abrahams, Minister of Public Works

Suriname is gearing up to be a regional transportation hub, with the construction and rehabilitation of key infrastructure

Suriname's government is well aware that to rise to its full potential, infrastructure development is a must. When the 2012 government budget was approved in February, roads, bridges, public schools and housing were all designated as key areas.

Improved transportation infrastructure could likely transform Suriname into a major hub that could link several countries within the region. The country has approximately 28,000 miles of major and minor roads, although most are unpaved. Two main arterial roads run through, called the Northern East-West Link and the Southern East-West Link. The former stretches from border to border, while the latter leaves from Apoera on the Guyana front and winds its way up to Paramaribo.

As of yet, no roads link Suriname to its southern neighbor - making these two the only South American nations not directly connected by land but there is a master plan to connect Paramaribo to Macapa in Brazil, via Pokigron in eastern Suriname and Brazil's Tumucumague Park (the world's largest protected continuous piece of pristine rain forest). The new route, which would consist of both road and railway, would link up with the existing highway that runs through Brazil's Pedra Branca do Amapari and on to Macapa on the Amazon Delta.

A recent Business Monitor International report stated that the "most significant feature of the investment agreements are the plans to make Suriname a major transport hub linking northern Brazil

(and the Amazon) to the Caribbean. The deepwater port combined with road and rail links to the Brazilian border should make Suriname a focal point of trade in the region, particularly given that neighbor Guyana has so far proved unsuccessful in its plans to develop its own deepwater port."

The Suriname-Brazil land connection project has found financial backing in China. In 2010, Minister of Public Works Ramon Abrahams signed Memoranda of Understanding (MoUs) with two Chinese companies: Cheng Don International and China Harbor, for US\$6 billion worth of investments. Other projects include the construction of a new deep-sea harbor, a sea dam from Albina to Nickerie, a new highway from Paramaribo to the Johan Adolf Pengel International Airport, and 8,000 low-income houses.

Financing from other Chinese sources will go towards building bridges that will span the Corentyne and the Marowijne rivers, which form the natural borders between Suriname and Guyana and French Guiana, respectively. [Read More]

Chinese investors, who put up colossal malls at the outskirts of Paramaribo seem to attract most customers. They stay open late and are not troubled by busy streets and parking issues.
