## President Obama Sends Message to Guyanese 9/11 Event

## **But Where Were the Guyanese Government Officials?**

The message from President Barack Obama was clear: he sympathized with the Guyanese community on the loss of its 25 nationals at the World Trade Center on September 11, 2001. Guyana's loss, per capita, ranks among the highest for the countries that were affected by the tragedy.

Mr. Obama's message was read by Congressman Gregory Meeks at a 9/11 Memorial event that was held in Queens, New York. If the President of the United States could see it fit to recognize the Guyanese victims and their families why couldn't the Guyana Government? This question was asked by many attendees who wondered why the Guyanese Ambassador to the US, the Consul General to New York. and other officials from the Government were absent.

The absence of recognition by officialdom in Guyana follows a pattern of neglect that may have its genesis long before the World Trade Center tragedy. It is well known that Guyanese politicians treat New York as a money tree and would spare no opportunity to make special trips to New York to collect sums of money for their political and other campaigns.

Once they are installed in office they are never around, not even to say 'thank you. How many times didn't politicians from Guyana make all sorts of promises to the diaspora? How many times did they not invite you to visit them in Georgetown for constructive engagement?

How many times

did you not take the trouble to visit their offices only to be told that the 'minister has just stepped out' and he or she can't see you? How many times didn't the Heads of State and other Ministers invite you to return to Guyana 'to serve your country' and when you get there they don't know what to do with you?
